  - a. Marcela shared her work on the Auto Award Pilot and audits she has worked on over the past three years. She generated reports to identify completed CDCP certificates, conducted a manual pilot, and presented the findings from a small study. It was noted that these students bypassed grad checks and counselor meetings, and the report took about a year to build. She acknowledged the committee's hard work on same-year course and narrative updates. Maricela also highlighted challenges with equivalencies affecting DegreeWorks negatively, particularly transitioning students between old and new programs. Issues with course automation were discussed, such as NG courses, since DegreeWorks only recognizes pass or no pass. She also shared future goals of the pilot and confirmed that she will continue with the process.
